Collegium Musicæ – 1st International Summer School "Music, Humanities and Sciences: Instrument Making"

Collegium Musicæ of Sorbonne University is very excited to present its first international thematic summer school, whose ambition is to promote multi-disciplinarity between humanities and sciences in the field of music. This program intends to bring together young researchers from the 4EU+ Alliance and beyond, for a week of training through theoretical courses and practical workshops, while considering tools and skills upon a common base of multi-disciplinary knowledge.

This first thematic summer school on Music, Humanities and Science (MuHaS) is organized in partnership with the Institut Technologique Européen des Métiers de la Musique at Le Mans, and focuses on instrument making. Through a series of workshops and conferences, it will spotlight two major instrumental categories, plucked strings and wind instruments. These instrumental categories are explored from several vantage points, including humanities, sciences and hands-on practice, thus articulating music, musicology, acoustics and instrument making. These convergent perspectives raise several questions and learning objectives, also in terms of multidisciplinarity. We will offer to question and evaluate collectively these multiple approaches which can be structured around a specific object and which will be

declined on several major themes, which bring out pluridisciplinary questions.

Rooted in different disciplinary fields — musicology, acoustics, instrument making, and performance practice—, the sessions will converge by the end of the week towards a global approach of musical instruments and instrument making.

The acoustical approach will develop different aspects of each one of our two families of instruments, through conferences and workshop sessions.

During the workshops on string instruments, the participants will be able to work on a simplified plucked string instrument, inspired by the guitar, the shamisen or the colacion. They will be able to modify and adjust different aspects of the instrument and evaluate their influence on the sounding and playing possibilities. We will thus try to evaluate the influence of the choice of the strings, alternatively proposed by the maker and the performer.



In the wind instruments' workshop sessions, the participants will work on a cylindrical resonator allowing different excitation possibilities, producing alternatively simplified flageolets, clarinets, chalumeaux or even testing the possibility of a digeridoo. Lateral holes and undercutting will be experimented.

Through material experience, the approach developed on the acoustics of musical instruments will address the interpretation of the main mobilized acoustic concepts.

A global view of the position of musicological studies in such an interdisciplinary approach will also be addressed, including historical perspective of music making, the status and functions of instruments in the repertoire and their evolution, through scores, iconography, historical organology, and close source readings. We will also discuss music challenges linked to restoration and conservation matters, museography and catalography of music instruments. Early music and historically informed performance issues, and repertoire and traditional music from the Mediterranean region are highly interested by our topic as well as the musical language in relation to the sound of the instruments, also focusing on the last hundred years, on the decompartmentalization of the orchestra sound and the enlargement of the soundscape.

Expert performers will experiment along with the participants and present their point of view on several aspects, such as the relation between instruments, musical style and repertoire, instrument making, the interaction they develop with makers, acousticians and musicologists, and their interaction with the instrument, engaging a body relation in which the playing gesture takes place.

SPEAKERS BIOGRAPHIES



PHILIPPE BOLTON

Philippe Bolton has been a recorder maker since 1974, when he was awarded a gold medal at the Lille Conservatory. His production today includes more than thirty recorder models, some of which are copies of historical instruments from the 15th to the 19th centuries, others being his own creations. He has developed and patented an electroacoustic recorder for contemporary music. He is also interested in the flageolet, an instrument that was played continuously between the 16th and early 20th centuries and which is rather forgotten in France today. Philippe Bolton is a Master Craftsman.



MURRAY CAMPBELL

Murray Campbell joined the academic staff at Edinburgh in 1972, and in 1985 founded the University's Musical Acoustics Research Group. In 2000 he was appointed Professor of Musical Acoustics at the University of Edinburgh. He retired from full-time teaching in 2008, and continues part-time teaching and research at Edinburgh as Senior Professorial Fellow and Professor Emeritus. He is co-author of three textbooks and numerous papers on the acoustics of musical instruments, and former co-chair of the EAA Technical Committee on Musical Acoustics.



PATRICIO DE LA CUADRA

Patricio de la Cuadra is an accomplished musician with a Diplome d'Interpretation Superior in flute from the Ecole Normale de Musique in Paris, who has played flute and various Chilean folk instruments in Europe, South America, Japan, Taiwan, and the US (including Carnegie Hall '94). He is currently Full Professor at the Pontificia Universidad Católica both at the Electrical engineering department and the Music department, where he teaches digital signal processing, musical acoustics, among other courses and co-directs the Center for Research in Audio Technologies.



JEAN-MARIE FOUILLEUL

A luthier since 1979, he was awarded the title of «Meilleur ouvrier de France» in 1989. He creates high-end guitars for an international audience. He currently has over 600 instruments to his credit. In parallel with his work in the workshop, he has been interested in the development of his art by participating in the creation of a training course within ITEMM, and by seeking closer ties with scientific circles within the UNFI association (Union Nationale de la Facture Instrumentale).



CLAUDIA FRITZ

Claudia Fritz is a CNRS researcher at the Institut Jean Le Rond ∂ 'Alembert (Sorbonne University). She is interested (in close collaboration with violin makers and performers) in the qualities of musical instruments, and how to correlate these qualities with violin making properties, vibro-acoustic properties and musicians' gestural control parameters. She was awarded the CNRS Bronze Medal in 2016 and an Acoustics and Science Award from the Violin Society of America in 2020.



FRANÇOIS GAUTIER

Francois Gautier is a professor at the Laboratoire d'Acoustique de l'Université du Mans, UMR CNRS 6613 and an aeronautical engineer. His research in musical acoustics concerns vibroacoustics and radiation of instruments (organ, trombone, guitar, harp, Stroh violin, Cristal Baschet) in connection with the practice of the instrument makers (Plateforme d'Aide à la Facture Instrumentale). He also coordinates projects related to the reduction of industrial noise, using the Black Hole Acoustic effect, an innovative technique adapted to light structures.



FLORENCE GÉTREAU

Musicologist and art historian Florence Gétreau is Director of Research Emeritus at the Centre national de la recherche scientifique (CNRS), Institut de recherche en musicologie (Paris). She was elected to the Academia Europaea in 2010 and is a Commandeur des Arts et des Lettres. She is the recipient of the Anthony Baines Memorial Prize, the Curt Sachs Award and the Claire Brook Award for Voir la Musique (2017). Former president of the French Musicological Society (2011-2015), she has been a member of the IMS Directorium since 2012.



MIGUEL HENRY

Lutenist, composer

Miguel Henry has a solid background in scholarship, musical acoustics, analysis and music history. Miguel Henry is a concert performer in numerous early music ensembles. As a composer, he works both on the reconstruction of incomplete works and on original compositions. Miguel Henry teaches at the Pôle Supérieur Paris Boulogne Billancourt, and at the Conservatoire à rayonnement régional de Boulogne-Billancourt and Tours. He co-directs with Akiko Veaux the Compagnie de l'Aune – www.compagniedelaune.com



DIMITRIS KOUNTOURAS

Born in Greece he specializes on recorder, historical flutes and Early Music. He is active as a performer, scholar and teacher and is the founder and director of Ex Silentio ensemble focusing on early music and Mediterranean traditions. He is teaching at the Athens Conservatoire and the Ionian University. He is researching topics of music history such as the relations between renaissance humanism and music, the Troubadours and the crusades, etc.



IWONA LINDSTEDT

Iwona Lindstedt is an Associate Professor and the current Director of the Institute of Musicology at the University of Warsaw. Her research interests focus on the history and theory of 20th- and 21st-century music as well as music analysis. She is a member of the Advisory Board of the book series Musical Cultures of the Twentieth Century. She has published books on serialism and sonoristics in the works of 20th-century Polish composers (2001, 2010), and a monograph on Kazimierz Serocki (2020).



INGA MAI GROOTE

Inga Mai Groote is Professor of Musicology at the University of Zurich. Her research focuses on the history of early modern music theory and its book culture, the circulation and understanding of music, and the impacts of confessional differentiation. Currently, she is a fellow at Historisches Kolleg München with a book project on the history of musical knowledge. She is the editor (with Iain Fenlon) of *Heinrich Glarean's Books: The Intellectual World of a 16th-Century Musical Humanist* (2013).



THIERRY MANIGUET

After studying science, musicology and musical acoustics, Thierry Maniguet specialised organology. Curator at the Musée de la musique (Cité de la musique – Philharmonie de Paris) since 2000, he has notably designed the presentation of the 19th and 20th century spaces and has curated in 2019 a new room dedicated to electronic music.. He is Professor at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique de Paris and is a lecturer in several French academic institutions.



BENOÎT NAVARRET

Benoît Navarret is a Associate professor at the Music and Musicology Department of Sorbonne University. He teaches musical acoustics, critical listening in phonography, audio recording techniques, and organology in relation to practices and research in the field of phonographic popular music. A specialist in the electric guitar, he has worked as a guide and researcher at the Musée de la musique de Paris, and as an author of educational content for the Cité de la musique.
